The Social Work "Profession"

We sometimes wonder whether the rush overseas is not an escape from "help thy neighbor." Dean Alton Linford, of the School of Social Service Administration at the University of Chicago, in recounting a new Bureau of Labor Statistics Report, points out that one out of every four practicing social workers in the United States has not finished college. One out of ten never attended college. Only one of five has had the two years of graduate training considered essential for professional social work. There are 105,000 social workers in all, and a great many are assigned to routine, low-grade tasks, while social and case problems abound.
